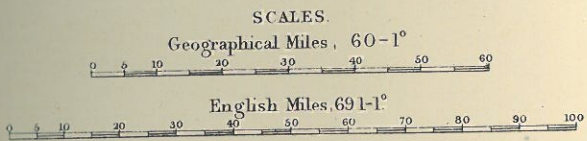


A MAP OF

Sir Samuel Baker's Route

At Manguo the Lake was seen to extend towards low ground on the N.W. but its limits are unknown.

The Asua and Kibi, two large rivers are reported by the natives to run to the N.W. from a chain of mountains in these parts.

The Lake was calm every day till 1 p.m. when a S.W. gale arose, and compelled the canoes to be hauled ashore.

General Altitude 4200 feet

(Known northwards as QUANGO, a variation of UGANDA)

Numerous Islands?

The Lake is reported by the natives to be well known as far as between 1° and 2° S. where it turns to the W. its further extent being unknown.

VICTORIA N'Y.

Captain Speke in 1858 made the Lake 3740 feet above the Ocean, but his observations at Ripon Falls gave a height of 3308 feet.
